- An attitude of humility is key to church unity. Paul uses the
 word meaning, "have this attitude, have the same mind," ten
 times in Philippians (1:7; 2:2 twice; 2:5; 3:15 twice; 3:19; 4:2;
 4:10 twice). This word is concentrated in places where he is
 encouraging church members to be humble for the sake of
 unity.
- The significance of women in the church in Philippi:
 - Lydia (Acts 16:14-15, 40)
 - A formerly enslaved girl (Acts 16:16-19)
 - Euodia and Syntyche (Phil 4:2)

Author and Date:

The apostle Paul, circa 62 AD, assuming that the imprisonment referred to (e.g., 1:13ff) is his Roman imprisonment.

The Church in Philippi:

Planted circa 50 AD (see Acts 16:11-40), on Paul's second missionary journey

Purposes of the Letter

- Acknowledgement of gift sent with Epaphroditus (4:18)
- Note regarding Epaphroditus's healing (2:25-30)
- Encouragement to reflect the gospel through living honorably and in church unity (1:27)
- Reassurance to concerned friends regarding Paul's situation (1:12-26)
- To address conflict within the church and plead for reconciliation (4:2-3)
- To encourage continued growth in devotion to Christ (2:1-13, esp. v.12)
- To encourage continued progress in love for each other (1:9)
- Exhortation to constant rejoicing (3:1; 4:4) and an example of rejoicing even in the midst of trials (1:18)
