"Inspiration"

- Word used in theology to refer to the divine origin of the Bible
- Definition: "the supernatural influence of the Holy Spirit upon the writers of Scripture which resulted in their writings being the words of God"

The Fact of Inspiration

(What we have been establishing)

1. Self-Claims: the authors of Scripture claim clearly and consistently that their words are God's words

2. Substantiation:

- Credibility of the authors and their writings
- Characteristics of divine authorship

The Method of Inspiration

("how" did God gives us His words?)

- He used men to write His words not inscribed in heaven; not angels
- These men were "moved" by the influence of the Holy Spirit

The Method of Inspiration

- Dual Authorship: "concurrency"
 - 1. Activity of the Holy Spirit
 - 2 Peter 1:20-21 "moved" (borne along)
 - 1 Peter 1:10-11 "the Spirit of Christ within them" (i.e. the prophets)
 - 1 Corinthians 2:4-13 "through the Spirit"
 - Although He employed a variety of means, all Scripture is ultimately a product of the Holy Spirit's activity

Divine Origin of Scripture The Method of Inspiration

- Dual Authorship: "concurrency"
 - 2. Human Agency
 - in general, not mechanical (dictation) the writers were very involved (Luke 1:1-4)
 - drew from their knowledge, circumstances, background, research; expressed in their own styles and personalities
 - "superintendence" God's providential oversight of the writers in the entire process of writing, including their preparation

Divine Origin of Scripture The Method of Inspiration Summary:

"God's continued work of superintendence, by which His providential, gracious, and supernatural contributions having been presupposed, His Spirit presided over the sacred writers in their entire work of writing..."
