Genesis 1:1-3

Restitution Theory

- Genesis 1:1: an account of the original perfect creation
- Genesis 1:2: the chaotic state of the world after God's judgement due to Satan's sin
- Genesis 1:3ff: an account of the recreation out of the chaotic state

Translation:

"In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth; and the earth became formless and void..."

Often called the "Gap Theory"

"Genesis 1:1-3"

Initial Chaos Theory

- Genesis 1:1: A statement of God's ex nihilo creation of the raw materials of the universe (i.e. time, space, matter, energy)
- Genesis 1:2: A description of the newly created earth in its yet unformed state (i.e. describes what God created in v1; initial stage of creation)
- Genesis 1:3ff: the account of the continuing creative work of God—shaping and ordering the unformed material

Translation:

"In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. And (now as to) the earth (it) was formless and void...

Genesis 1:1-3

Precreation Chaos Theory

- Genesis 1:1:
 - a summary statement of chapter one (a formal introduction or title)
 - (2) a dependent clause connected with verse three stating the beginning of God's creative work
- Genesis 1:2: a description of the chaotic state of the earth before God begins to create
- Genesis 1:3ff: the account of God creating order from the preexisting chaos of verse two

Translation:

- "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. And (Now) the earth was formless and void..."
- (2) When God began to create the heavens and the earth (the earth was formless and void...) God said ..."

- Correct sense of bere'sit
- Meaning of bara'
- Meaning of hashshamayim we-ha'ares
- Use of the waw in v2
- Correct sense of the verb hyh in v2
- Meaning of tohu wa-bohu in v2
- The significance of "darkness" and "water"

"Genesis 1:1-3"

Exegetical/Interpretive Issues

- 1. Sense of bere'sit
 - · Absolute not construct: "In the beginning"
 - v1 is an independent clause
- 2. Meaning of bara
 - Emphasis on the newness of an object; used only of God's activity
 - Ex nihilo is not inherent in the word itself
- 3. Meaning of hashshamayim we-ha'ares
 - "merism" meaning the ordered universe, the complete cosmos
- 4. Construction of verse 2
 - waw disjunctive introduces a circumstantial clause (not sequential)
 - hyh is stative ("was") not active ("became")
