Exodus from Egypt

Two prominent features:

1. The overarching purpose of God in the Exodus

2. The means God employed to achieve this purpose

Exodus from Egypt

God's Overarching Purpose

To display His power that He might be "known" as Yahweh

- that Egypt and Pharaoh would know that Yahweh alone is God
- that Israel (and others) would know that He is Yahweh

Exodus from Egypt

God's "Unusual" Means

- > the hardening of Pharaoh's heart
 - referred to 18x (subject: Pharaoh 3x; no subject 5x; the Lord 10x)
 - reason to ensure that Pharaoh does not let Israel go!

Pharaoh's Hard Heart

Preface:

- Pharaoh was not an neutral person
 - He was an obstinate idolater
 - · He was without excuse for His unbelief
 - His judgment by God at any point was just

Pharaoh's Hard Heart

Observations:

- 1. It was in accord with Pharaoh's desire
 - God did not create evil in Pharaoh but directed it for His purposes
 - concurrent action the action of Pharaoh and the ultimate action of God
 - Pharaoh was guilty for his stubborn refusal to obey God

Pharaoh's Hard Heart

Observations:

- 2. It was God's intention from the start
 - Exodus 4:21 & 7:3 God stated His clear intention beforehand
 - The hardening of Pharaoh in each instance was in accord with God's intention ("as the Lord had said")

Pharaoh's Hard Heart

Observations:

- 2. It was God's intention from the start
- > Implications:
 - it was not God's response to Pharaoh but God's purpose for Pharaoh
 - God's purpose was not to save Pharaoh but to harden him so as to display His power to the honor of His name (9:16)
