But He answered and said, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel."


But she came and began to bow down before Him, saying, "Lord help me!"

Bread for Gentiles

A. The Canaanite Woman

- 1. Jesus' Seeming Reluctance
 - as the Jewish Messiah, Jesus' mission was first and foremost to the people of Israel
 - He tested her faith by making her unworthiness of mercy very apparent



Bread for Gentiles

A. The Canaanite Woman

- 2. The Woman's Great Faith
 - it is a desperate, persistent faith directed at Jesus as Lord
 - it is a faith filled with a sense of unworthiness that pleads for undeserved mercy

And departing from there, Jesus went along by the Sea of Galilee, and having gone up to the mountain, He was sitting there.

And great multitudes came to Him, bringing with them those who were lame, crippled, blind, dumb, and many others, and laid them down at His feet; and He healed them,

so that the multitude marveled as they saw the dumb speaking, the crippled restored, and the lame walking, and the blind seeing; and they glorified the God of Israel.

And Jesus called His disciples to Him, and said, "I feel compassion for the multitude, because they have remained with Me now three days and have nothing to eat; and I do not wish to send them away hungry, lest they faint on the way."

And the disciples said to Him, "Where would we get so many loaves in a desolate place to satisfy such a great multitude?"

And Jesus said to them, "How many loaves do you have?" And they said, "Seven, and a few small fish."


And He directed the multitude to sit down on the ground;

and He took the seven loaves and the fish; and giving thanks, He broke the bread and started giving them to the disciples, and the disciples in turn, to the multitudes.

And they all ate, and were satisfied, and they picked up what was left over of the broken pieces, seven large baskets full.

And those who ate were four thousand men, besides women and children.

- 1. Jesus' messianic power
 - instant, complete healing of every kind of severe disability (c.f. Isaiah 35:5-6)
 - feeding thousands from a few loaves of bread and a few fish with leftovers!

- B. Healing & Feeding the Multitudes
- 2. Jesus' compassion for Gentiles
 - a foreshadowing of God's mercy poured out upon the Gentiles
 - a foretaste of the Messianic banquet it will include Gentiles
