

"I Came to Call Sinners"

Matthew 9:9-13

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And as Jesus passed on from there, He saw a man called Matthew, sitting at the tax booth; and He said to him, "Follow Me!" And he arose, and followed Him.

And it happened that as He was reclining in the house, behold many tax-gatherers and sinners came and reclined with Jesus and His disciples.

And when the Pharisees saw this, they said to His disciples, "Why is your teacher eating with the tax-gatherers and sinners?"

But when He heard this, He said, "It is not those who are healthy who need a physician, but those who are sick.

But go and learn what this means, 'I DESIRE COMPASSION, AND NOT SACRIFICE,' for I did not come to call the righteous, but sinners."



Jesus Calls Sinners

- 1. Example of Matthew
 - : illustrates the kind of person Jesus calls
 - as a tax-collector, Matthew represents a wider group of "sinners" (undesirables)
 - Matthew's response indicated a thorough-going trust in and submission to Jesus



Jesus Calls Sinners

- 2. Jesus' unexpected mission
 - ❖ "I came to call sinners"
 - His mission was characterized by grace, by the pursuit of the lost (undesirables)
 - He saw sinners as needy not as despised and contaminated



Jesus Calls Sinners

- 3. Jesus' indictment of "the righteous"
 - "I did not come to call the righteous"
 - righteousness that puts ritual before mercy is not the righteousness of the kingdom
 - those who exclude themselves from the category of "sinners" have no part in Messiah's call
