The Greater Story

Greater Story

- > The greater purpose of the Book of Ruth:
 - To show the preservation and legitimization of David's family line through God's election and providence

Greater Story

- 1. Connection to Perez (Tamar)
 - Yahweh preserved the line of Judah by means of Tamar a foreign, childless widow
 - so also Yahweh preserved the line of Perez by means of Ruth a foreign, childless widow

Greater Story

- 2. Character of Ruth and Boaz
 - Ruth, the Moabite, displayed a covenant love (hesed) beyond any in Israel
 - Boaz, through his generosity and role as the *go'el*, embodied the very essence of the Law

These are the ancestors of King David!

Greater Story

- 3. Connection to Jesus the Messiah
 - > Matthew 1:1-17
 - the Lord preserved the line of Messiah by means of Ruth and Boaz
 - inclusion of unlikely women Tamar, Rahab, Ruth and the "wife of Uriah"
