#### Paul's Conclusion

<sup>30</sup> "Therefore having overlooked the times of ignorance, God is now declaring to men that all *people* everywhere should repent, <sup>31</sup> because He has fixed a day in which He will judge the world in righteousness through a Man whom He has appointed, having furnished proof to all men by raising Him from the dead."

<sup>32</sup> Now when they heard of the resurrection of the dead, some *began* to sneer, but others said, "We shall hear you again concerning this." <sup>33</sup> So Paul went out of their midst. <sup>34</sup> But some men joined him and believed, among whom also was Dionysius the Areopagite and a woman named Damaris and others with them.

## A Call to Repentance

- 1. A Universal Call
  - a call to turn from inexcusable idolatries to worship the one, true and living God (cf. Rom. 1:18-23)
  - a new era of repentance is now available to all the nations

## A Call to Repentance

- 2. An Urgent Call
  - in light of God's coming, inescapable judgment of the world in righteousness
  - in light of God's appointed agent of judgment the man, Christ Jesus

# A Call to Repentance

- > Implications
  - no true knowledge of God apart from Jesus
  - death is not final there is a judgment
  - reconciliation to God is available through Jesus
