What Advantage Has the Jew?

Romans 3:1-8

Then what advantage has the Jew? Or what is the benefit of circumcision?² Great in every respect. First of all, that they were entrusted with the oracles of God. ³ What then? If some did not believe, their unbelief will not nullify the faithfulness of God, will it? ⁴ May it never be! Rather, let God be found true, though every man be found a liar, as it is written,

"THAT YOU MAY BE JUSTIFIED IN YOUR WORDS, AND TRIUMPH WHEN YOU JUDGE."

⁵ But if our unrighteousness demonstrates the righteousness of God, what shall we say? The God who inflicts wrath is not unrighteous, is He? (I am speaking in human terms.) ⁶ May it never be! For otherwise, how will God judge the world?

⁷ But if through my lie the truth of God abounded to His glory, why am I also still being judged as a sinner? 8 And why not say (as we are slanderously reported and as some claim that we say), "Let us do evil that good may come"? Their condemnation is just.

Justification of God

1. Jewish Advantage

- · supreme privilege of being entrusted with the oracles of God
- "oracles" spoken utterances of God; refers to the entire Old Testament

Justification of God

- 2. Jewish Unbelief
 - · the primary failure of the Jews was their unbelief
 - · this unbelief in God's word culminated in a failure to embrace Jesus as the Messiah promised by that word

Justification of God

- 3. Righteousness of God
 - A. Paul's Answer
 - human unrighteousness (unbelief) serves to promote the righteousness of God

Justification of God

- 3. Righteousness of God
 - B. Objections (faulty inferences)
 - God would be unrighteous in judging people for sin and unbelief
 - Paul's teaching would imply that we should do evil that good may come

Conclusion:

 God aims to shut up all men under sin in order that His righteousness in Christ by faith might be manifested (Rom. 3:19-20; 11:32)
