³¹ What then shall we say to these things? If God *is* for us, who *is* against us?

³² He who did not spare His own Son, but delivered Him over for us all, how will He not also with Him freely give us all things?

³³ Who will bring a charge against God's elect? God is the one who justifies;

³⁴ who is the one who condemns? Christ Jesus is He who died, yes, rather who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who also intercedes for us.

Romans 8:31-39

A Celebration of Our Security in Christ

"What then shall we say to these things?"

- Romans 8:31

"Who is against us?" (v. 31)

"Who will bring a charge against God's elect?" (v.33)

"Who is the one who condemns?" (v. 34)

"Who shall separate us from the love of Christ?" (v.35)

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(Romans 8:33-34)

What Shall We Say?

- 1. "Who will bring a charge against us?"
 - no charge will stand against "God's elect" (chosen)
 - no one can successfully charge us because God is the one who justifies us

What Shall We Say?

- 2. "Who is the one who condemns?"
 - no one can condemn us, especially not Christ to whom all judgment has been committed
 - no one can condemn us because of Jesus Christ's mediatorial work for us

What Shall We Say?

- Christ's Mediatorial Work:
 - 1. "Who died"
 - His death removed the grounds of our condemnation

What Shall We Say?

- Christ's Mediatorial Work:
 - 2. "Who was raised"
 - our justification is secured and manifested in the resurrection of Jesus
 - the death of Jesus for us is meaningless apart from His resurrection (c.f. 1 Cor. 15:17)

What Shall We Say?

- Christ's Mediatorial Work:
 - 3. "Who is at the right hand of God"
 - He is exalted as the glorified Son over all rule and power and authority as our representative (c.f. Eph. 1:20-21)

What Shall We Say?

- Christ's Mediatorial Work:
 - 4. "Who intercedes for us"
 - His continued presence before God, as the crucified and risen Son, secures forever our pardon and the continued supply of grace

- $^{25}\mbox{Therefore He}$ is able also to save forever those who draw near to God through Him, since He always lives to make intercession for them. (Hebrews 7:25)
- ¹⁴ Therefore, since we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold fast our confession. ¹⁵ For we do not have a high priest who cannot sympathize with our weaknesses, but One who has been tempted in all things as *we are, yet* without sin. ¹⁶ Therefore let us draw near with confidence to the throne of grace, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need.
