"Therefore ... "

- 1. Importance of Paul's Order
 - Christian behavior is grounded in and motivated by what God has done in Christ
 - the exposition of the gospel includes its power in life; it produces a transformation in conduct
 - exhortation is still necessary because the flesh is still a real and present danger (we await final redemption)

¹¹ *Do* this, knowing the time, that it is already the hour for you to awaken from sleep; for now salvation is nearer to us than when we believed.

 $^{12}\,\rm The$ night is almost gone, and the day is near. Therefore let us lay aside the deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light.

¹³ Let us behave properly as in the day, not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual promiscuity and sensuality, not in strife and jealousy.

¹⁴ But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh in regard to *its* lusts.

- 2. "By the Mercies of God"
 - Mercy God's (unmerited) forgiveness of the guilty and tenderhearted compassion for the helpless
 - God's mercy in Christ is the motivation and basis of Christian conduct

- 2. "By the Mercies of God"
 - we experience God's mercy as a power that exerts a total and all encompassing claim upon us – our only fitting response is equally all-encompassing
