A Living Sacrifice

- Beware of a Debtor's Ethic
 - our response to God's mercy toward us is never an attempt to repay God
 - "good deeds do not pay back grace; they borrow more grace" (J. Piper)

A Living Sacrifice

- A. The presentation of our entire persons as a sacrifice
 - a "sacrifice" communicates belonging wholly to God; we are not our own
 - "bodies" refers to the entire person, with a special emphasis on our interaction with the world

A Living Sacrifice

- A. The presentation of our entire persons as a sacrifice
 - (1) "living" perpetual, lasting, never neglected
 - (2) "holy" set apart exclusively for God
 - (3) "pleasing" desired and accepted by God

A Living Sacrifice

- B. This offering of ourselves is our "true worship"
 - it is consistent with a proper understanding of God's grace in Christ
 - it is genuine in its inwardness and outwardness
