Romans 14:1-15:13

- **15** Now we who are strong ought to bear the weaknesses of those without strength and not please ourselves.
 - ²Let each of us please his neighbor for his good, to his edification.
- ³ For even Christ did not please Himself; but as it is written, "THE REPROACHES OF THOSE WHO REPROACHED YOU FELL UPON ME."
- ⁴ For whatever was written in earlier times was written for our instruction, so that through perseverance and the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope.
- ⁵ Now may the God who gives perseverance and encouragement grant you to be of the same mind with one another according to Christ Jesus.
- ⁶ so that with one accord you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Are you a "people-pleaser"?

 Negatively – an inordinate desire for the approval and acceptance by others ("fear of man")

For am I now seeking the favor of men, or of God? Or am I striving to please men? If I were still trying to please men, I would not be a bond-servant of Christ. (Galatians 1:10)

Are you a "people-pleaser"?

- Negatively an inordinate desire for the approval and acceptance by others ("fear of man")
- Positively a self-denial for the good of others, which is an expression of biblical love

Pleasing Others, Not Ourselves

- A. Obligation of the "Strong"
 - 1) Bear the weakness of those "unable"
 - respect their conscience without criticism and seek to protect them from spiritual harm

Pleasing Others, Not Ourselves

- A. Obligation of the "Strong"
 - 1) Bear the weakness of those "unable"
 - 2) Please your neighbor for his spiritual good
 - not mere "men-pleasing" but genuinely seeking the spiritual good and building up of others

Pleasing Others, Not Ourselves

- > "Not please ourselves"
 - expresses the radical mindset-shift of a Christian from self-centered to others-centered
 - · the mindset exemplified by Jesus

Pleasing Others, Not Ourselves

- B. Example of Christ ("did not please Himself")
 - > Paul's use of Psalm 69
 - David typology David, God's anointed, in his unjust sufferings is a type of the Christ
 - Psalm 69 applies ultimately and more directly to Jesus in His sufferings

Pleasing Others, Not Ourselves

- B. Example of Christ ("did not please Himself")
 - all the enmity of people against God was directed at Christ; he was the innocent "victim"
 - He identified Himself with the supreme interests of those He came to save, and thus bore this reproach
 - the force of Christ's example is in the complete dissimilarity with our situation
