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# King Ahab and Aram (1 Kings 20)

- ➤ Unexpected happenings!
  - · No Elijah but several unnamed prophets
  - · Yahweh gives victory to Ahab over Aram
  - Unusual ending (another prophet-killing lion!)

## Context: "Holy War"

- Warfare directed and prosecuted by Yahweh through His people Israel
  - the execution of God's just judgment on His unrepentant, idolatrous enemies
  - herem absolutely and irrevocably devoted to Yahweh for destruction ("under the ban")

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## **Principles:**

- 1. The necessity of obeying God's word in every circumstance
  - beware of rationalizing disobedience out of human reasoning or preference
  - obedience to His word is always for our good/

**Principles:** 

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- 2. The exaltation of His name alone is God's chief purpose
  - God acts to vindicate His name as the only and true God...
  - so that we might known Him as Yahweh, the One who acts in grace and judgment

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#### **Principles:**

- 3. The vindication of God's name must include His just judgment
  - Yahweh, the divine warrior, saves His people through the judgment of His enemies
  - Israel's covenant disobedience also demands divine judgment – an irreconcilable tension?

#### **Principles:**

- > Christ, the Divine-Warrior
  - by His death and resurrection Jesus triumphs over God's enemies in justice
  - in Christ enemies die under God's judgment and are raised to newness of life

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<sup>9</sup> For in Him all the fullness of Deity dwells in bodily form, <sup>10</sup> and in Him you have been made complete, ... <sup>12</sup> having been buried with Him in baptism, in which you were also raised up with Him through faith in the working of God, who raised Him from the dead. <sup>13</sup> When you were dead in your transgressions and the uncircumcision of your flesh, He made you alive together with Him, having forgiven us all our transgressions, <sup>14</sup> having canceled out the certificate of debt consisting of decrees against us, which was hostile to us; and He has taken it out of the way, having nailed it to the cross. <sup>15</sup> When He had disarmed the rulers and authorities, He made a public display of them, having triumphed over them through Him.
