## Singleness as a Gift

- > Foundations:
  - (1) God's covenant people are produce through new birth/regeneration not physical descent
  - (2) Christ's family (the church) is more permanent and precious than biological family
  - (3) Marriage and family are temporary for this age; the church is primary and eternal

<sup>3</sup> Let not the foreigner who has joined himself to the LORD say, "The LORD will surely separate me from His people." Nor let the eunuch say, "Behold, I am a dry tree."
