

THE PSALMS

- Ancient Hebrew Poetry 150 songs, hymns and prayers of the Israelites
- Psalm 1 and Psalm 2 operate as a gateway into the Psalter
 - Psalm 1 tells us who the Psalter is intended for and Psalm 2 tells us who the Psalter speaks of. (Waltke)

PSALM1

- [1] How blessed is the man who does not walk in the counsel of the wicked,

 Nor stand in the path of sinners,
 - Nor sit in the seat of scoffers!

PSALM 1 - THE TWO WAYS

- NOT SIT III the seat of scoriers:
- [2] But his delight is in the law of the Lord,

 And in His law he meditates day and night.
- [3] He will be like a tree firmly planted by streams of water,
 - Which yields its fruit in its season
 - And its leaf does not wither;
 - And in whatever he does, he prospers.

PSALM 1

- [4] The wicked are not so,
 - But they are like chaff which the wind drives away.
- [5] Therefore the wicked will not stand in the judgment,

 Nor sinners in the assembly of the righteous.
- [6] For the Lord knows the way of the righteous,
 - But the way of the wicked will perish.

PSALMS1

- Main point -
 - The path of the righteous is one of a rooted-delight in God's word and ends in a luscious-blessed eternal state.

PSALMS1

- Approaching the text
 - The two ways presented
 - The illustration of the two ways
 - \bullet The eternal destiny of the two ways

THE TWO WAYS

- The way of the wicked is one of *progressive indulgence* in the values, beliefs and pleasures of the world
- The way of the righteous is characterized by:
 - An attitude of delight in God's word
 - Sole devotion to God's word

THE TWO WAYS ILLUSTRATED

- The psalmist is eliciting Edenic imagery to direct our minds to eternal realities (cf. Ezek. 47:12, Rev. 22:2)
 - The righteous like a tree firm and fruitful
 - The wicked like chaff untethered and withered

THE ETERNAL DESTINY OF THE TWO WAYS

 The two ways will end in judgment with the righteous known and blessed by God and the wicked sent into eternal destruction

JESUS IS THE BLESSED MAN IN PSALM 1

• It is *by His* righteous life that we can enter the congregation of the righteous

IMPLICATIONS

- We must become people who are rooted and delight in God's word
- Thinking about our eternal future is a means of perseverance
