Part One: (Heb.1:1 - 4:13)

Hold fast to God's final, decisive word in His Son ¹⁷ Therefore, He had to be made like His brethren in all things, so that He might become a merciful and faithful high priest in things pertaining to God, to make propitiation for the sins of the people. ¹⁸ For since He Himself was tempted in that which He has suffered, He is able to come to the aid of those who are tempted.

3 ¹Therefore, holy brethren, partakers of a heavenly calling, consider Jesus, the Apostle and High Priest of our confession.

Our Sympathetic High Priest

- 1. Our Great High Priest
 - as the eternal Son who is fully man, He has entered God's presence on our behalf
 - "therefore" let us continue to live a life that professes faith in Christ

Our Sympathetic High Priest

- 2. Our Sympathetic High Priest
 - His incarnate life gives Him inner understanding of human weakness, and makes Him ready to give active help
 - because He has experienced and overcome every kind of temptation, He is able to empower us in our weakness

- 2. Our Sympathetic High Priest (therefore...)
 - let us draw near to God without shame, or fear of condemnation or lack of acceptance
 - let us draw near to God in the face of trials and temptations to receive the grace needed to hold firmly to the faith we profess
