¹ Now even the first *covenant* had regulations of worship and the earthly sanctuary. ² For there was a tent prepared, the first one, in which *were* the lampstand and the table and the sacred bread; this is called the holy place. ³ Behind the second veil there was a tent which is called the Holy of Holies, ⁴ having a golden altar of incense and the ark of the covenant covered on all sides with gold, in which was a golden jar holding the manna, and Aaron's rod which budded, and the tables of the covenant; ⁵ and above it *were* the cherubim of glory overshadowing the mercy seat; but of these things we cannot now speak in detail.


⁶ Now when these things have been so prepared, the priests are continually entering the first tent performing the worship, ⁷ but into the second, only the high priest *enters* once a year, not without *taking* blood, which he offers for himself and for the sins of the people committed in ignorance.

⁸ The Holy Spirit *is* signifying this, that the way into the holy place has not yet been disclosed while the first tent is still standing, ⁹ which *is* a symbol for the present time. According to which both gifts and sacrifices are offered which cannot make the worshiper perfect in conscience, ¹⁰ since they *relate* only to food and drink and various washings, regulations for the body imposed until a time of reformation.

No Access to God!

- > The Inadequacy of the Old Sanctuary
 - 1. The design/function of the earthly sanctuary
 - it did not reveal the way of access into the presence of God (the heavenly sanctuary)
 - it's symbolic value is now clearly seen in light of the time of fulfillment brought by Christ

No Access to God!

- > The Inadequacy of the Old Sanctuary
 - 2. The sacrifices of the earthly sanctuary
 - they were external, ceremonial, temporal and weak devoid of divine power to cleanse
 - they had no power for inward transformation or the cleansing of the conscience

No Access to God!

- > The All-Sufficient Sacrifice of Christ!
 - His "blood" results in a conscience that is set free and no longer burdened by knowledge of sin and feeling of guilt (9:14)
 - our relationship with God is not characterized by separation and uncertainty, but by nearness and confidence
