The Apostles needed convincing!

To these He also presented Himself alive after His suffering, by many convincing proofs, appearing to them over a period of forty days and speaking of the things concerning the kingdom of God.

(Acts 1:3)

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Resurrection Basics

- 1. The tomb was empty
 - the risen Jesus is the same person, body and soul, who died and was buried
 - Jesus was not raised in spirit only, nor was He given a completely new body or form

Resurrection Basics

- 2. The resurrection was bodily
 - Jesus was not a spirit or an apparition but fully human ("flesh and bones")
 - He engaged in normal physical activities including eating and drinking

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Resurrection Basics

- 3. The risen Jesus was different
 - He was raised to a new kind of human life no longer subject to weakness, aging, or death
 - His resurrection life is His life forever now glorified and reigning

Resurrection Basics

- > Jesus is the "first-fruits" of our resurrection
 - Jesus is both the guarantee and prototype of our future resurrection (cf. 1 Cor. 15:20)

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²⁰ For our citizenship is in heaven, from which also we eagerly wait for a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ; ²¹ who will transform the body of our humble state into conformity with the body of His glory, by the exertion of the power that He has even to subject all things to Himself.
